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## Reflection from our President – Annette Matthews



Dearest Sister Daughters,

What a time to be alive! So much has happened in the last few months to upend all areas of our lives, not least our DOK Assembly and our chapter meetings.

I assume many chapters have resorted to ZOOM or Facebook meetings like mine.

Some have begun sewing face masks to donate and others have started other non-contact outreach projects. Our creativity and imaginations have been challenged to pray, serve and evangelize in new ways.

On the diocesan level, the spring assembly had to be cancelled the week before it was scheduled at St. John the Divine, Houston. Bishop Fisher and I had been in contact prior to that date and together with the guidance of Bishop Doyle determined that, despite the low Covid-19 infection case numbers in our state, especially in Harris County, we should cancel the assembly out of an abundance of caution. I immediately sent notification via the Vice President and Convocation Representatives about the cancellation and the choices available to registrants regarding their registration fees. We were one of the first organizations to do so, preceding the Fat Stock Show and Rodeo. As the next week unfolded it became clear that we had made the correct decision.

I also called for an hour of prayer regarding those affected or potentially affected by Covid-19 on Friday evenings between 7 PM and 8 PM beginning the night our assembly would have convened for as long as the pandemic remains a distinct threat to us and those we love. Prayers are located on our TX website.

The good news to arise from the cancellation is that St. John the Divine's Mary Magdalene chapter has volunteered to host the exact same assembly next spring on March 5-6. The keynote speaker and workshop leaders are all on board as well! So, if you think you missed out on assembly this year, the very same assembly, "The Cosmic Christ", will take place next spring unchanged in content or speakers! Luckily, no business requiring Assembly approval was on the Assembly's business agenda.

The Reverend Dorothy had eagerly anticipated seeing us in March. She's written a lovely meditative message and questions for us to consider in these pandemic times. You may not know it but The Reverend Dorothy is a quiet, steady, and wise spiritual presence over all of us Daughters in the diocese.

Your board has been busy as well. On the day the board would have met at Assembly we approved by email 2 grants and chose a recipient for the province outreach grant. You can read more about these grants in Shirley Siler's article. You are encouraged to submit grant suggestions and/or applications.

I just appointed a nominations committee to ask a few of you to stand for elected diocesan offices next spring. Nominations are scheduled for presentation at this fall's assembly on September 19 at Camp Allen, depending upon meeting guidelines at that time. In any case, the nominations will be presented either at the assembly or online.

Great news! As a result of the grant we made in the fall, a Spanish Chapter Manual is nearly ready for posting on the National website! *Ultreya!*

The Vice President is prepared to receive your chapter’s officers list in August and continues to forward important national, province, and diocesan emails to your Convocation Representative to forward to you via your chapter president. If you aren’t receiving these emails, please, let Karen Courville know. Your Convocation Representative even now forwards your DOK communications and this *Angelus*.

Shirley Siler, our Treasurer, continues her essential financial work while our Membership Secretary, Margaret Carpenter, monitors chapters in need of assistance. Secretary Cheryl Kimbrough has written a powerful meditation for this issue of the *Angelus*. Dr. Linda Patterson and the GBS stand ready to grace us with song whenever they and we are safe to meet as groups. Patsy Organ, Prayer Chair, distributes prayer requests along the diocesan prayer chain as soon as she receives them. Webmasters Teresa Antley and Linda Blumberg have diligently updated the website and Linda edited this *Angelus*.

In spite of all the pandemic turmoil, a new JDOK chapter, Queen Esther, at Holy Apostles Church in Katy, awaits installation while an adult chapter at St. James, Taylor, is in the process of reactivation. Our JDOK Directresses, Adelle Muller-McKinstry and Vicki Terrell, are already planning next year’s JDOK retreat while updating membership and plans to train chapter directresses about important JDOK paperwork, soon to be revealed on YouTube. See Adelle’s fabulous article about this year’s retreat, “GodWords School”. And thank-you to every adult DOK who volunteered at the retreat and its Saturday lunch. You were invaluable to the retreat’s success.

Good Shepherd’s Daughters of the Shepherd Chapter, Tomball, and St. James the Apostle’s Mary & Martha Chapter, Conroe, are actively preparing to host our fall assembly at Camp Allen on September 18-19, 2020, on the assumption it will proceed as scheduled. If not, they are prepared to host Assembly on September 17-18, 2021, at Camp Allen.

Rather than write something encouraging or spiritual (which I had at first thought to write), I realized that it’s more important that you be reassured your diocesan officers continue to work for you, to be there for any questions you might have, to plan for the future. Being Christians, we believe that God has plans for us here in this awesome world He created for us and that, after our lives in our humanly-aware Christ, we will continue to live in Christ who is and forever will be available to us. We should “Be not afraid,” even when, frankly, we are.

Our faith promises us, as Julian of Norwich said, ““All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of thing shall be well.” I pray for you

## Meditation from our Chaplain – Rev. Dorothy Gremillion



Do you ever hear a song get started in your head, and you “hear it” either constantly or from time to time throughout the day? And then sometimes you hear it the next day as well? Do you welcome hearing it, or does it drive you crazy when you can’t “turn it off?”

I hear music in that fashion. Sometimes it’s the same song ad infinitum, day after day after day. Sometimes, it’s a song that I don’t even like. And I can’t turn it off. I’ve learned that I just need to let it run its course.

Then once upon a year, I learned to think of that ability to hear music in my mind as a gift to be thankful for. It’s a gift that presents itself with yet another gift -- something to be learned from its sudden intrusion into my mind. That has helped. I can’t tell you the number of times I’ve relaxed into the music and simply listened. I’ve even prayed, “Lord, what do you want to show me by letting me hear this song today?” Often, I’ll be surprised by the answer that comes.

When I was being trained to be a Daring Way™ Facilitator a few years ago, one of the exercises we had to work with, was to choose a particular piece of music that would represent for us, the life that we have lived. They called it “our anthem.”

I’ve been thinking about all this over the last few weeks. I’ve asked myself, “What song would I choose to represent my anthem for this time of the “stay-at-home” order because of the COVID-19? Some of the emotions I’ve experienced include fear, anxiety, impatience, frustration, overwhelmed, and how best to care for family and church, not just about “me and mine,” but also about “you and yours.” I think my “anthem” during this time would have to be “You Are My Hiding Place.” Listening to it always brings me back to “calmness.” Here’s a Youtube link of that song for you.

Whether or not your chapter is required to hold elections this year, be sure to complete your chapter's officers form as soon as you know your officers for the 2020-2021 term. Copies should be sent to National (it can be done online) and to your Convocation Representative so she will know to whom to forward diocesan communications. The officers form is available online. Most importantly, this is the only way national learns who is the chapter president to permit her access to her chapter's database.

The chapter database provides names of all the chapter's members, their dues status, and demographics. The chapter president must have this information and, in turn, may correct any misinformation by relaying corrections to national for its staff to update the database.

Thank-you for your help in keeping the database accurate and the communications open in our diocese.

Only a Daughter in good standing is allowed to wear the cross and use The Order's trademarks. With this in mind, we now have the trademarks available for download from the national website. However, you must be signed in to your membership profile to access the Trademark download page. In order to access your membership profile, you must be a Daughter in good standing.

After signing in, you can find the Trademarks page under Resources > Trademarks of The Order. The Trademark Policy is available on this page as each Daughter who uses a trademark will need to review the latest policies and procedures. The page has many file formats available, all with the required ®, with explanations as to each type. If you have a fabric item that cannot include the ®, you must have an official label that can be obtained for free from the national office. Special Note: The CD with trademarks is no longer available to order from the national office.

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## Musings from our Parliamentarian – Kathryn Wahnoutka Due in August

No, I am not expecting another grandbaby in August although that would be a joy. I am expecting my long-awaited book to arrive on Amazon and other book sites. **Single, Whole, Free, ME! Escaping from Domestic Abuse** is the story of my abusive first marriage, how the prayers of my DOK chapter helped God to pull me out of that marriage, and my journey through recovery.



This book recounts my experiences and lessons learned with all their pain, humility, and humor. I share my experiences for two reasons:

- To empower those traveling a similar road of abuse to survive and grow.
- To help their friends and loved ones understand and support the abused person in their recovery.

I would like to take this moment to thank all of you who prayed for me over the years. And a special thank you to those who heard part of my story and encouraged me to write this book. Here is a small excerpt from the book.

*At home, the battering continued. Tom had quit church all together. He could not stand for me to have friends or outside activities. He would not allow me to wear my Daughters of the King cross. He called my prayer sisters names and the Order a cult. He tore up my Bible and threatened me on many occasions. I wore my DOK cross at work but took it off before coming home.*

*One day I forgot to take it off. When I walked in the back door, Tom was standing a few feet away. He screamed that if he ever saw that cross again, he would destroy it. A black aura seemed to engulf the room. I felt like I was facing Satan himself, but Tom did not touch my DOK cross or me that day. Only later did I realize that Tom never hit me when I was wearing my cross. Strange . . .*

Tears were a big part of my healing. My favorite quote in the book explains how important tears are in our lives.

*Tears can be a life-giving signal for us in our lives, both individually and collectively. They can indicate that vital places within us that have become dormant are being stirred afresh. They can also be a type of washing of the inner lens. We have come to see certain things most clearly in our lives and relationships only through tears, the tears of pain and loss or the tears of delight and laughter . . . To pay attention to our tears is to hear the deepest longings of the human soul. It is to hear again the ancient yearning for well-being and harmony.*
